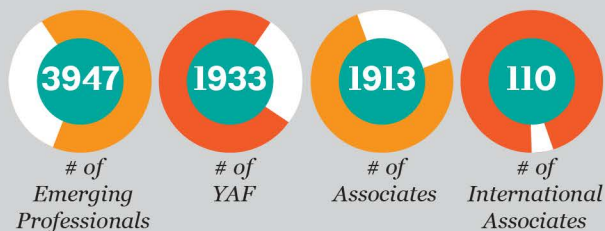

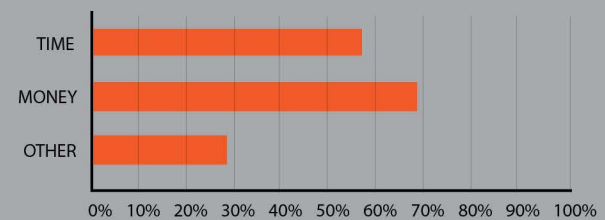

AEP Survey Regarding Licensure 2017

New licensees aren't entering the profession as robustly as in past decades. Anecdotally, we've heard the impediments include cost, increased regulation, and decreased "value" of the license.

The Academy for Emerging Professionals conducts an annual survey of all associate members to determine the real problems facing those on the path to licensure and what firms can do to support their efforts.

84 RESPONDENTS

- recognition and title increase in the firm too and actual involvement with more responsibilities
- better tangible support from firm leaders and management, clear expectations, commitment to job promotion and/or pay increase.
- professional recognition
- responsibility after licensure, opportunity for professional growth
- advancement in career
- time, compensation, reimbursement from employer (incentives) and most importantly an easier process of obtaining the license.
- more firm support of studying and study materials, time off to prep and take exam.
